Dear Governor Schwarzenegger,

As you prepare to release your proposed 2008-09 budget, we urge you to consider the importance of California's environment and the contributions made by our natural resources to the state's economy and our quality of life. We recognize the challenges posed by the estimated \$14.5 billion budget deficit, but we are concerned that across the board budget cuts of 10% or more would decimate, if not eliminate, key resources and environmental protection programs.

Based on the 2007-08 budget, the Resources Agency and Cal-EPA collectively comprise only 1.7% of General Fund spending. The lion's share of that is spent by the California Department of Forestry on fire protection, with the remainder spread across a wide array of programs, from parks to endangered species to rivers and coastal waters. General Fund revenues have, over time, been backed out of most environmental programs. For example, our state land conservancies now rely almost exclusively on bond funds. And funds that were previously directed to environmental programs now contribute to the General Fund. For example, the share of tidelands oil revenue previously allocated to natural resource programs now goes exclusively into the General Fund. And since 2000, nearly \$3 billion in dedicated public transit funds have been redirected for non-public transit purposes. Environmental programs are already stretched thin, with little or no buffer to absorb further cuts.

It is clear that the State has already plucked the "low-hanging fruit" in previous efforts to balance the budget by making significant cuts to California's environmental programs. We are concerned that further cuts will get to the point of seriously compromising the integrity of California's environmental programs. Thus, any opportunities for future reductions will require a careful examination to ensure that core environmental protections remain. While private-public partnerships may hold promise for some environmental programs, these partnerships are not a substitute for designing long term fiscal strategies to keep this programs vital. For example, user fees and targeted taxes would help ensure that the beneficiaries of at least a limited number of environmental programs are covering the cost of those programs. In particular, we draw your attention to



and urge you to consider some of the innovative budget reforms proposed in the 2001 and 2004 *Green Scissors Reports* (copies attached), including cost-sharing by landowners whose wildland fire protection is currently fully covered by state taxpayers via the General Fund.

The environment matters to Californians. We believe the state can rise to the current challenges while still effectively carrying out its public trust responsibilities. We look forward to working with your administration and legislative leadership on solutions to address the projected budget shortfall for 2008-09.
